Parx Vaulting to Prominence with Breeders' Cup Preps

Parx Racing is quickly becoming an important spot to launch a successful run at the Breeders' Cup World Thoroughbred Championships.

According to Director of Racing Sal Sinatra, "We have shown time and time again that our races have great timing leading up to the Breeders' Cup. In addition, three-year-olds who compete in our signature events, the Grade 2 Pennsylvania Derby and the Grade 1 Cotillion Stakes, are more likely to compete as four-year-olds."

For example, this year Golden Ticket, who ran second in the 2012 PA Derby, has a victory in the Prairie Meadows Handicap and runner-up finishes in two Grade 1 races on opposite sides of the country, including the Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile.

The Racing Office and the PTHA are proud to provide this recap of Parx horses at the 2013 Breeders' Cup.

Classic hero **Mucho Macho Man** is trained

by Kathy Ritvo, whose family is heavily involved in Mid-Atlantic racing.

BREEDERS' CUP DIRT MILE

• Over the past few years, a quartet of horses have passed through Parx on their way to the 2013 Dirt Mile. **Golden Ticket** rallied to finish second behind scintillating winner Goldencents, after Golden Ticket had run second in the 2012 PA Derby. Also from last year's PA Derby was **Alpha**, who had picked up a victory in the 2013 Woodward Stakes (G1) at Saratoga. (cont'd on page 4)



What a year it's been here at Parx Racing! We have accomplished a lot over the past twelve months, but there is still a long road ahead of us. Last year we succeeded in preventing millions of dollars from being diverted from the Racehorse Development Fund, but we have an even bigger battle to fight this upcoming spring.

Executive Director Mike Ballezzi and I have been working fiercely with the Pennsylvania Racing Coalition to fund and settle a \$5 million shortfall this upcoming fiscal year so that we can continue to offer competitive purses to our horsemen.

In addition, we are working alongside the Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association to ensure that the shortfall in the breeders' funds is met, which is especially important for PA-bred horses, the economy, and even conserving greenspace by giving Pennsylvania farms the incentive to continue operating in our state.

We realize that the past month has been extremely difficult for horsemen as we deal with an EHV-1 quarantine here at Parx Racing. Fortunately, due to prompt action by the PA Department of Agriculture and track management, we have been able to contain the virus within our facility. We are hopeful that we will be able to open our Galloway Road gates in early December. In the meantime, we are very grateful that we have been able to maintain racing

programs despite the quarantine.

Also, we ask that you vote in the current PTHA election, and consider who will best match *your* needs, so that we can continue our fight in Harrisburg for you, the horsemen.

And finally, as 2013 comes to a close, we wish you happy holidays and a hope that you have a great new year!

From the Desk of Executive Director Michael P. Ballezzi

Integrity, Safety, Fairness:



I have always believed and have continually acted on the fundamental principal that as the Executive Director of the PTHA, I and President Sal DeBunda, along with the PTHA Board of Directors, are responsible for protecting horsemen. The word "protective" is in the title of the largest and original Horsemen's Association; the National Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association.

The mission of all Horsemen's Associations is to protect horsemen. It is the opinion of this Executive Director that this mission is best accomplished by guaranteeing that the Equine Industry is grounded on the principles of: Integrity, Safety and Fairness.

To guarantee the Integrity of our Industry, Horsemen's Associations must be ever vigilant and tireless in their efforts to rid the industry of those unscrupulous individuals who misuse and abuse drugs to gain an illegal, immoral and unethical advantage. To those individuals there must be zero tolerance. This rightful effort to protect horsemen by maintaining the highest standard of Integrity in our Industry is best achieved by the joining of the major stakeholders of our industry. Horsemen, operators, regulators and legislators must join together in establishing laws, rules, regulations and guidelines that are strictly enforced and which guarantee to all participants in our industry a level playing field.

To guarantee the Safety of our Industry, Horsemen's Associations must ensure that our Industry provides our horses the best training and racing facilities available, state of the art drug testing and monitoring which protects and ensures the health and safety of our horses, and well-trained racing officials and regulators who develop fair and equitable standards to oversee the operation of our industry.

The three most important safety measures are:

- 1. Strict compliance and enforcement of medication rules.
- 2. Maintenance of a safe racing surface.
- 3. Competent and dedicated racing regulators and officials.

To guarantee the Fairness of our Industry, Horsemen's Associations must ensure that our Industry continues to strictly apply and enforce the rules of racing and establish new rules and regulations. Rules which prohibit the use of illegal drugs. Rules that demand strict safety standards for the protection our horses. Rules that expel "cheaters". Rules that protect the betting public. Rules that protect honest horsemen.

Clearly, it is my opinion, that in order to deliver on my responsibility to protect horsemen I must strive to maintain and develop an Industry based on Integrity, Safety and Fairness. The Industry as a whole and the individual horsemen are one and the same. Each is tied to the other by their duty and responsibility to the other. By protecting the horsemen I must strive to guarantee the Integrity, Safety and Fairness of the Industry and by guaranteeing the Integrity, Safety and Fairness of the Industry, I and President Sal DeBunda, along with the PTHA Board of Directors, are achieving our responsibility of protecting the horsemen.

Parx-Based Indian Jones Runs in Breeders' Cup

On November 1st, Gold Starr Racing LLC's six-year-old Indian Jones returned to the location where his career started - Santa Anita Park. The son of champion Smarty Jones began his racing career in Southern California, and after a heartbreaking nose loss to 2010 Breeders' Cup Marathon winner Eldaafer in the Sept. 2nd Greenwood Cup Stakes (G3) here at Parx, the connections of Indian Jones decided to give their gelding a chance in this year's race.

Indian Jones shipped out to Arcadia a week early, and was soon followed by trainer Phil Aristone, who is a board member and Treasurer of the PTHA. Also joining the group were his owners and Parx-based jockey Angel Castillo. The chestnut gelding ran a gallant race but experienced a string of bad luck, including an awkward start that resulted in him being shuffled back to last by well over ten lengths. Despite the early trouble, Indian Jones closed ground valiantly down the stretch and finished fifth by just three lengths.

According to Aristone, "Indian Jones came out of the race in great shape. However, due to the quarantine, we are now looking at other options from our original plans, including the December 31st Auld Lang Syne Stakes here at Parx."

EHV-I Brings Quarantine at Parx Racing

The Parx Racing backside was hit with an outbreak of equine herpes virus (EHV-1) this November, resulting in a shutdown of the stable gate exit to all horses. The quarantine began on November 13th, and will continue until at least December 10th. Racetrack management and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture have teamed up in order to combat the spread of EHV-1, and are confident that the virus has been contained quickly and efficiently.

The state's required quarantine period has been in place since 2007, and is based on the recommendations of the University of Kentucky's Maxwell H. Gluck Equine Research Center. All exposed horses must be quarantined for a minimum of 21 days, and the "clock" is started when the infected horse first shows signs of illness. If a new horse shows signs of the virus, the timetable is reset to the day of the latest diagnosis.

Thus far, two horses have tested positive for the neurological disease, and if any additional horses spike a fever without a negative test, or are positively diagnosed with the virus, the required three weeks of quarantine will be reset.



Dr. Alize Simeone, VMD, is the regional veterinarian for the Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services in Southeastern Pennsylvania, and has been on the grounds here in Bensalem since the outbreak first occurred. Her goal from the beginning was to keep the virus contained within the larger facility, and in turn to keep it from spreading within itself. This

is why multiple barns are quarantined separately from the decision by track management to shut down the traffic of horses leaving the grounds.

The reason for such restrictions is that the virus is extremely infectious. According to Dr. Simeone, "all it takes to spread

the disease is close contact with another horse shedding the virus". Since horses can sneeze as far as 35 feet, and snotty noses are a symptom of EHV-1, keeping the exposed horses under close wraps is a huge help in containing the disease. In addition, humans can carry the virus on clothing or equipment when moving between horses.

The quaratine has resulted in smaller fields hitting the entry box, but Director of Racing Sal Sinatra was pleased with the response from horsemen who are able to run out of their own barns here at Parx. "We have to thank our horsemen for helping to fill races through the quarantine, which has allowed us to continue our scheduled racing programs."

In addition to the most obvious form of biosecurity - keeping horses from leaving - many other precautions have been taken in an effort to keep the virus from spreading. Not only are the assistant starters at the gate and the horse identifier wearing disposable gloves, but the gate crew is also disinfecting the starting gate after each race, as well as after morning training. Maintenance has moved the manure cans of the quarantined barns, so that they are a safe distance away from unaffected horses. Large signs warning of the dangers have been placed at all entrances to the closed barns.

There are also a number of suggested precautions that Dr. Simeone has urged horsemen to follow, including taking a horse's temperature often, remembering to wash off all organic material *before* sanitizing equipment, wearing disposable gloves, and not entering the affected barns if at all possible. If you must enter one of these barns, make sure to bring a full change of clothes, including footwear, and also conduct your business there *after* visiting other barns.

Dr. Craig Shultz, DVM, Director of the Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services, closed out a meeting with concerned horsemen by stating how positive his opinion is of how the track has handled the outbreak. "We support the decision not to allow the gates to be open by track management. Racetracks have actually done very well with this (virus); better than other equine industries."



It is only a week away from Thanksgiving, as I write this; my barber and so many others tell me that Thanksgiving is their favorite holiday. 


Condolences...
