RECORD PURSES FOR HORSEMEN

Philadelphia Park horsemen will reap purse increases amounting to about \$15,000 a day, the largest single boost in the history of the racetrack, after the State of Pennsylvania agreed to pump \$10 million from parimutuel taxes back into the racing industry.

The State's four racetracks, Philadelphia Park, Penn National, the Meadows and Pocono Downs, will divide the financial windfall, with each share based on total handle.

Philadelphia Park will thus receive the largest amount, approximately \$4.5 million, or 45 percent of the total package, with 22 percent each going to Penn National and the Meadows and 11 percent to Pocono Downs.

Horsemen and management at each track will split equally the money allotted to their venue, with the horsemen's share going directly to purses. At Philadelphia Park, it means horsemen will realize \$2.25 million more in their

pockets every year.

Under guidelines worked out by the State Legislature, the racetrack operators must use their portions exclusively in ways that will enhance the sport, such as marketing, capital improvements, facility maintenance and general promotional activities.

In addition, horsemen will no longer be obligated to contribute bonuses owner Pennsylvania-bred races, savings contnued on pg. 10

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE . . .

Flash — After many, many months of negotiations, our horsemen have received \$10 million in new money to assist the racing industry in Pennsylvania. This new money is coming from the State budget.

All of the principals of Pennsylvania horse racing met with Secretary of Agriculture, the Honorable Samuel Hayes Jr., in Harrisburg. There were two meetings, Friday, May 26 and Friday, June 2. The purpose was to decide how to distribute the \$10 million.

A meeting was held June 1 with the PBHA and PTHA. Attending were President Robert Szeyller, Vice President Bill Brady and Mark McDermott, Joe Santanna, President of Penn National HPBA, PTHA Executive Director Mike Ballezzi, Purse Analyst Edward Simon and yours truly. All agreed it was a productive meeting.

Many thanks to all the above for achieving a successful outcome. Also thanks to our lobbyists, Steve Wojdak and Mike McLaughlin.

* * *

An attempt to break a 22-year-drought in the Triple Crown just wasn't meant to be. Fusaichi Pegasus failed to win the Preakness but he did manage to snap a 21-year string in which no favorites won the Kentucky Derby. Jenine Sahadi, trainer of the Deputy, also failed in her bid to become the first female conditioner to capture the Derby.

Congratulations, however, are due to one of our local trainers, Joe Orseno, for winning the Preakness with Red Bullet.

Joseph King, a consultant from Port Washington, N.Y., came to Philadelphia Park at our request, to test the racing surface. PTHA Executive Director Mike Ballezzi, Director Steve Rowan, Track Superintendent, Roy Smith, Director of Racing, Salvatore Sinatra and yours truly walked the mile track taking samples, measuring depths, etc.

The group, by the way, covered the mile in a slow 58 minutes.

The track surface was in terrible condition. King gave his report; he was scheduled to return in June.

"It's a great day for us, for the fans, for everybody," he said after the race. "We owe a debt of gratitude to (Riviello) and Mike Larry (Ballezzi)."

Landicini was referring to the work accomplished by PTHA President Riviello, Executive Director Ballezzi and their Board of Directors in developing the local event, patterned after the Claiming Canterbury Park, Minnesota, that debuted last year and continues with the second running Aug. 6.

Philadelphia Park offered the same seven events, in distance and surface and even name of the individual stakes, as Canterbury, where purses for the Claiming Crown this year will total \$560,000.

Added interest sparked locally by awarding bonuses to the winning connections to help cover travel expenses and nominating fees to the event in Minnesota. If the winners decide not to go,

the bonus money will be passed on to

the highest-placed finisher in each stake who does make the Canterbury trip.

There was no doubt that winning one of the Claiming Crown Preview races put stars in the eyes of the successful owners, some of whom are brand new to the sport but obviously are quick learners.

Lime Lake co-owner Phillip G., explained what Claiming Crown Preview Day. she anticipated before the

race in which their mare ran down

dueling early leaders Big Fish and Omelet.

"We hoped would she catch the speed," she said.

"You sound like a handicapper" was told.

"We've only

been in horse racing since January of this year," she said. "Chris taught us everything we know."



system pegged on placings in races ranging from claiming and starter events to allowance races and stakes.

Based on comments by owners and trainers at Philadelphia Park on Claiming Crown Preview Day, Team Pennsylvania is a ship that's set to sail.

"We're going," was the flat statement of Barry McCarty, owner of Bion, who captured the \$30,450 Rapid Transit Stakes at 6 1/2 furlongs.

"Definitely," said Farrel Mann, the trainer of Programable, ridden by Rolanda Simpson to a stunning victory at odds of more than 40-1 in the \$20,550 Express Stakes at 6 furlongs. Simpson also scored with Felite Patet in the \$33,300 Emerald Stakes in the Preview.

Mann, a dentist who is preoccupied with training racehorses these days, then hedged a bit about skipping on down the road to Canterbury.

"We're going if Rolanda goes," he said.

The hedge was quickly cleared by Simpson, who said, "I'm going if he goes."

Husband and wife owner-trainer duo Lisa and Randy Allen said they bought Original Copy with the Preview and the Claiming Crown in mind and were rewarded by winning the \$20,500 Iron Horse Stakes with the eight-year-old gelding.

"We'll have to see if we have enough points to qualify for Minnesota." said Randy Allen.

Tanya Boulmetis, trainer of High Gale, winner of the \$30,400 Tiara Stakes at 1 1/16 miles on the turf, had more to celebrate than most of the successful connections.

Not only did she score with High Gale wire to wire in the filly's first ever try on the grass, the Claiming Crown Preview Day was also Boulmetis' birthday. Her plate might have been too full to immediately consider Canterbury Park.

"We'll have to think about it," she said after noting one of the reasons she tried her very quick filly on the turf was because, "speed tends to carry on grass."

Thomas R. Miller, who trained Felite Patet to victory in the \$33,300 Emerald Stakes on the grass, approached the idea of participating in the Claiming Crown in Minnesota with some caution.

Miller pointed out the six-yearold gelding was winless in ten starts last year.

"He wasn't too healthy." Miller said. "He's a bad-footed horse."

Not so bad footed that he hasn't made it halfway to Minnesota this year, though.

And finally, if there is any hesitation on the part of the other owners who are thinking of being members of Team Pennsylvania, Robert Orfanelli gave a ringing endorsement of the venture.

Orfanelli, who owns B Flat Major, winner of the Preview Day's richest race, the \$50,450 Jewel Stakes at 1 1/8 miles, took Emperor Tiger to Canterbury Park last year for the Claiming Crown and finished second, a feat that earned the owner more than \$20,000.

"I loved it out there last year," said Orfanelli.

It goes without saying that he wouldn't mind taking part again.

If the whole point is that treating claiming horses like royalty spreads excitement and interest to every level of the industry, Orfanelli is proof it's working.





that will amount to about \$1.4 million a year at Philadelphia Park.

Added to the \$2.25 million increase in purses, it brings the immediate worth of the package for local horsemen to \$3.65 million a year.

The agreement between the

State and horsemen to redistribute parimutuel taxes to provide a major boost for the racing industry was the result of behind-thescenes negotiations over the last couple of years that were spearheaded locally by PTHA President Larry Riviello, Executive Director Mike Ballezzi, 1st Vice President Sal DeBunda, the PTHA Board of Directors, Purse Analyst Ed Simon and lobbyists Steve Wojdak and

Mike McLaughlin.

Also instrumental were Penn National HPBA President Joe Santanna and his Board of Directors, State Senate Majority Leader F. Joseph Loeper, House Majority Leader John M. Perzel, Secretary of Agriculture Sam Hayes and State Senators Robert M. Tomlinson and Jeffrey E. Piccola.

SURPRISING - BUT COMMENDABLE

In a Belmont Stakes that was most notable for the horses that weren't entered, the human element provided the winning edge as trainer D. Wayne Lukas captured his 13th victory in Triple Crown races to tie Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons' record and jockey Pat Day registered his third score in the final leg of the classic series by guiding Commendable, at odds of 18-1 to the winners' circle.

Fusaichi Pegasus, who won the Kentucky Derby, sat out the Belmont after suffering a slight injury in his stall and Red Bullet,

who passed the Derby and upset Fusaichi in the Preakness, skipped the last leg on a decision by his connections.

All of which left the Belmont a wide-open affair, underscored by the fact that Commendable's only prior victory came in his maiden breaker last August at Del Mar. Lukas' charge was kept out of the Preakness after finishing 17th in the Kentucky Derby, beaten 26 lengths by Fusaichi Pegasus.

Commendable's owners, Bob and Beverly Lewis, won their first Belmont. They failed in this race in 1995 and 1999, just missing a sweep of the Triple Crown each time after taking the first two legs with Silver Charm and Charismatic.
